### Flag and Bells following the announcement of the death of Queen Elizabeth II

The Union flag was raised to half-mast within 30 minutes of the announcement.


It was raised to full mast on Saturday at 11am for the proclamation and lowered again to half-mast at 1pm on Sunday where it should stay until the day after the funeral (following the protocol issued)

Father Guy toiled the tenor bell for 96 strokes at 12 noon on 10th September.

Ringers from Chilcompton came on Saturday morning to put muffles on the bells so they were half-muffed. This means the hand-stroke was the normal volume of strike and the backstroke was muffed giving the effect of an echo.

Our three Midsomer Norton ringers (Guy, Kate & Tim) were joined by ringers from Chilcompton, Farmborough and Newton St Loe on Sunday 11th September enabling all 12 bells to be rung before the 10am Service.





#### Dear Friends,

I wonder where and when you heard the news that our nation's longest serving monarch had died? For me it was a long awaited holiday. I had just returned from a blustery walk by the sea. Suddenly our moods changed as the news on the television came to hold our attention.

From then on our screens and airwaves have been filled with word and image, as our nation has sought to come to terms with the reality that things do not last forever, life comes to an end for all, even for a Queen.

Someone who had overseen many of our lives, who had subtly acted as a glue, holding our nation together, a constant in our changing fortunes, had suddenly gone. But we all know that this earthly life ends, and like us all, Queen Elizabeth II was one of us. She was human. She was flesh and blood. She was a daughter, granddaughter, a sister and aunt, a mother and grandmother...

Yet she was this, not only for her own flesh and blood, but for our nation – a symbolic constant in our nation's life. Throughout her life, for many she could be a daughter, granddaughter, a sister and aunt, a mother and grandmother...

But more than this, in our nation's life she came to symbolise qualities that for many seemed lost - service, honour, devotion to duty, and dignity.

As our Head of State, our Queen, she was able to reach beyond her flesh and blood to fulfil a daunting role. Yet here was a young woman, recently married, who by the accident of birth, found herself at Westminster Abbey, with crown, sceptre and orb...a young queen, head of an Imperial family and Head of State of a war ravaged democracy. How on earth could she do it?

For Queen Elizabeth II, it was faith that made her acceptance and discharge of this overwhelming duty possible. And to all, this young woman came to be known as the right person, in the right place at the right time. Few, if any, could have discharged her duty with such dignity and humility.

For Queen Elizabeth II, this accident of birth was no accident, it was no role she had fought others to claim for herself. This role was a God -given calling, her vocation, her God-given duty and one that only faith would enable her to fulfil. And it was that faith that enabled her to do so with such dignity, subtlety and adept skill.

As we adjust to the turning of time, to the ending of one reign we embrace the new, praying that our new King, Charles III, will be as upheld by his own strong faith.

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#### ST JOHNS CHRISTMAS FAYRE - SATURDAY 3RD DECEMBER 10-12



### The same yesterday, today and forever

Many of us know well Bob Dylan's song 'The Times They Are A-Changin'. Was it written with us in mind? None of us could have predicted the changes that we have seen in



2022. The death of our beloved Queen Elizabeth, the accession of a new King, a war in Ukraine, a cost-of-living crisis. None of these were on the cards as we made our new year's resolutions on the 1st of January.

Yet happen they have. And whether we like it or not, we're forced to agree with Bob Dylan's lyrics that the times are indeed changing. What can see us though these days?


A phrase that's often used about the period through which we're going is 'unprecedented'. I'm not sure it's entirely valid! Previous generations have faced situations as challenging or more than ours — seasons of plagues, wars, famines and conquest. The times in which the New Testament was written were, for its writers, periods of profound uncertainty. Its writers faced violence and vulnerability, conflict and dispute. Yet into their times they were able to speak words of hope, confidence and assurance.

One such phrase that stands out for me is a line from the letter to the Hebrews. Hebrews was written in response to a time of persecution and the possibility of people falling back from the faith as a result. Into its time and ours, the writer of the letter makes an extraordinary claim: 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever.' (Hebrews 13:8)

Just imagine! The one who walked in Galilee has been there for his people throughout time, is with us now, and will be whatever the future may hold.

So respectfully, I have to disagree with Bob Dylan. In his song he tells us that in the face of times that are 'a-changin', we'd better start 'swimmin'. Much better than hyperactive splashing, I suggest, is to live out our vision to 'live and tell the story of Jesus'. For it's as we do so that we can hold fast to the one who is constant and unchanging, who holds us always in the palm of his hands; Jesus Christ who is 'the same yesterday, today and forever.'

# Bible Sunday: how many translations by now?

Ever wonder how many Bible translations there are in the world? And how many more are still needed? Wycliffe Bible Translators reports the following, as of 2021:



There are now 3,495 languages, which have some Scripture available to 7.04 billion people.

This figure of 3,495 breaks down into:

717 languages with a complete Bible – 5.75 billion people

1,582 languages with a complete New Testament (some also have Old Testament portions) – 830 million people

1,196 languages with some translated Bible portions – 457 million people

Meanwhile, there are a further 828 languages which have work in progress – 67.6 million people. And also, there are 1,892 languages still waiting for translation (or preparatory work) to begin – 145 million people.
