#### **Reflection from the Vicarage**

Dear Friends,

There's no mistaking that autumn has arrived; nights are drawing in fast and winter approaches once again. As leaves fall from the trees and plants die back, it seems to fit the natural cycle that we spend time remembering and reflecting on all the bounty that we have enjoyed over the fruitful, 'growing' months.



November is, of course, a month for remembering. We begin as we mean to go on by remembering and giving thanks for all the saints, all those who have gone ahead of us in faith and whose stories cheer and inspire us, on All Saints' Day on the 1st. On the 2nd we will remember with love and gratitude the Faithful departed, recognising that we are all able to share worship of God, whether in this life or the next. We recall the deeds of Guy Fawkes and his co-conspirators on the 5<sup>th</sup>, and give thanks that we live in more peaceful times in our country's history and that the flashes and bangs are fireworks to enjoy, rather than gunpowder. On the 11<sup>th</sup> we will observe with the whole nation a period of silent reflection to mark the signing of the Armistice Treaty to signal the beginning of the end of the First World War. On that occasion and again on Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> we will respectfully remember those who have given their lives in the service of their country, praying for their families, and pledging ourselves anew to the cause of peace. We will pray too for those serving in the Armed Forces, especially for those in combat, for those who support them, and those who watch and wait at home for their safe return.

All this remembering is, of course, in addition to the weekly act of remembrance in which we all share each and every communion service, when we commemorate the life, death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, finding in our sharing of bread and wine encouragement and renewal on our own journeys of faith.

And in this season of remembering there is no harm in remembering our own baptism into the Christian faith, our own personal commitment to Christ, and our promise to encourage one another in the faith.


Don't forget, remembering can be a form of prayer.

# A formal, and not so formal, Welcome

The final step of Bishop Michael becoming the 80<sup>th</sup> Bishop of Bath and Wells will take place when he is installed at a service at Wells Cathedral on Saturday, 12 November.



While Bishop Michael legally became Bishop of Bath and Wells in June, and has already been out and about visiting parishes and deaneries, the service in November marks his formal welcome to the diocese.

People from across Bath and Wells, many of whom have been involved in the selection and interview process, will have a role in the service. They include school children and young people, people from church communities across Bath and Wells, community and charity representatives, and local leaders of other faiths.

On the morning of the service, which will take place at 3pm, Bishop Michael will attend morning prayer at Bath Abbey and travel back to Wells using a range of forms of transport, meeting and greeting the people of Bath and Wells along the way.

Bishop Michael says, "Before I was interviewed for the role of Bishop of Bath and Wells my wife Lizzie and I undertook a 60 mile walk around the diocese so it felt only fitting to undertake a similar pilgrimage on the morning of my installation. I hope to meet many people of Bath and Wells along the way as I travel by foot, electric bike, bus, tractor and lorry from Bath, through Peasedown St John, Chilcompton and back into Wells in time for the service."

The ticketed service will be livestreamed via the diocesan Facebook page so individuals and churches across the diocese and beyond can share in the occasion.

#### Walsingham 18th - 23rd SEPTEMBER 2022

It was with light hearts and great anticipation that 13 of us, including all 4 of our clergy and how blest we were to have them and 3 new pilgrims, Mary Grant and Jenny & Colin Chapman, set out after the 10am Mass from the car park. Our newcomers were Roman Catholics friends of Fr. Tony, who wanted to experience the Anglican Shrine. They proved to be excellent additions to our intrepid group and we were able to settle them into the routine of the pilgrimage quite quickly. The rest of us were old stagers for the most part, though Fr. Philip was a relative new boy of course having joined the Parish recently. Matthew Livsey by contrast, has made the Pilgrimage 31 times! We left just after 11:30am and apart from a desperately slow passage through Bath, made good time and reached Walsingham at 5:45pm, in time to tumble, in some cases guite literally, out of the mini bus having sung the Walsingham hymn for the last 15 minutes under the musical direction of Heather Hill. We gave Pete Winsley and Fr. Guy, our 2 brave drives, a resounding round of applause, before unloading and tottering off to our respective rooms to unpack, get a bit sorted out and get to supper by 6:30pm.

So much for the journey, now to the events of the week. We had our first visit to the Holy House at 8pm, the perfect start and thence by degrees to much needed bed. There is not any point in describing the daily routine. You will have to come with us next year to understand it all! Suffice to say that on each day Morning Prayers were at 8:30am followed by a hearty breakfast, Mass at 11am and an Evening service at 8:15pm every day. The services included a United Mass including all the Pilgrims from the many parish groups, some 200 of us in all, a Stations of the Cross service led by Fr. Guy, our own 11am services in the Shrine, a Healing Mass with sprinkling at the well in the Shrine, the evening procession lit by candles, all 200 of them, round the grounds and back to the Shrine for Benediction. We had free time to wander, shop, eat our lunches and walk the Holy Mile if we chose to.


On Wednesday we drove to Sheringham and spent time beside the sea. It was great fun and Fr. Guy braved the North Sea, or rather paddled in it. He said it was warm, I didn't believe him. His prize - the biggest ice-cream I have very seen. On Thursday we had a Lunch Party organised by Pat Clynes, Carol Moore and Heather Hill. It was a very happy gathering.

Perhaps I should mention the Bull, a pub just opposite the Shrine entrance. Religion is thirsty work! Some of us, in fact most of us, would return there after the evening service to chew the fat and enjoy the local beer or what else they had to offer.

On Friday we took an early breakfast and had our last service in the Holy House. We were very sad to leave and the return journey (with one or two diversions!) went well and we got back to St Johns about 5:45pm. We have already began to plan for next year and we will keep you posted. It was a wonderful pilgrimage and will not be forgotten for a very long time.



### Called to walk the way of the cross

A message from the Rt Revd Michael Beasley, Bishop of Bath and Wells

As I prepare to be installed as the 80<sup>th</sup> Bishop of Bath and Wells on the 12 November, I have been



reading and re-rereading the charge given to me by the Archbishop of Canterbury when I was legally confirmed as bishop back in June. The charge can found be on the diocesan website. Please do take a look at what it says.

The charge is terrifying. It calls me to walk the way of the cross. It urges me to rely not on my own strength, but on that provided by the Lord. The charge asks me to 'speak out on behalf of the voiceless, and for the rights of all who are vulnerable' (Proverbs 3:18). It reminds me that I am to be the shepherd of the flock entrusted to me. It also includes calls to be committed to the highest standards of safeguarding and care of the environment.

Reading my charge makes me wonder whether I have been invited to impersonate the Archangel Gabriel! Thankfully it also includes words which act to make the whole thing possible. Chief among these is this phrase: I am called to 'build a church where each stone is valued'. Drawing on the writings of the First Letter of Peter (see Chapter 2), the charge calls me to remember that I'm not doing this all alone. We are doing it all together.

I've already been discovering this as I've travelled around Somerset attending worship in different churches and meeting new clergy colleagues. The installation will see people gather from across the county, committing together to our vision of 'Living and Telling the Story of Jesus'. Undertaking that task with authenticity and integrity is the greatest charge of all. It's one that I'm looking forward to sharing with you.
