

Reflection from the Vicarage

Dear Friends,

Happy New Year to you all, and I hope you all had a joyful Christmas.

No sooner are we into the New Year, than we find ourselves having reached the twelfth day of Christmas and then the Feast of the Epiphany. What a wonderful feast the Epiphany is; intriguing foreign astrologers,



following a star, and offering precious gifts to a baby of humble birth laid in a manager. The Epiphany is rich in symbolism and meaning, when all our senses can be awakened as we come to worship God, and not forgetting the poignant hymns that are sung.

One obvious and important theme is the offering of gifts, of Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh. The first is a royal gift: the child is 'born king'. The second is a priestly gift: frankincense was offered in the Temple at the altar of incense. Myrrh sounds a note of future suffering, because it was used to anoint the dead. King, priest, prophet: gifts foretelling the future of Mary and Joseph's child. These gifts given in adoration show an outpouring of unconditional generosity in response to God's generosity and love as revealed in the Christ Child.

An important question for us all, is how do we as a community of faith and as individuals respond to God's overwhelming and generous love to us. Will we respond as the Magi from the East did with open and generous hearts? What we offer, whether in time, talents or treasure will shine like the star and show our commitment to God and our faith in Him.

I fully appreciate that currently we are facing a cost of living crisis and overwhelming energy costs. As a Community of Faith, we face the same rising bills and so your P.C.C. is keeping a close eye on our church finances.

Now the outlook isn't bleak, but we need to be aware of possible problems ahead. If we carry on as we are, and don't look again at our stewardship and giving, then the pot from which we can balance our accounts will become empty!

I am very aware that these times of economic constraint are difficult for many and as we venture into a new year, we will access our own situation and make decisions in the light of our commitments. May I ask you to consider your response to God's overwhelming generosity to us, as revealed at the Epiphany, with open minds and generous hearts, just as the Magi have shown.

I leave you with a possible new year's resolution; to reflect upon God's generosity and pray that we will respond in some way.

Are you looking out for Jesus?

In January, our churches enter the season of Epiphany which my dictionary defines as 'a moment of sudden and great revelation or realization'. I wonder what your epiphanies have been? When have you seen things for the first time? Experienced the penny dropping? Understood things in a new way?



In our churches, the readings for the Sundays of January are all about moments that revealed who Jesus is. The arrival of the wise men showed that Jesus is for everyone, not just the people of Israel. Jesus's baptism revealed his relationship with his Father and the Holy Spirit. The production at Cana of enough top-quality red plonk to take several baths in made clear the abundance of God's love for us. The end of the Epiphany season, the feast of Candlemas (actually 2 February), marks the moment when Jesus was seen as 'God's salvation for all peoples' (Luke 2: 31).

The challenge with epiphanies is whether we're looking out for them. If our eyes are wide shut, we don't see an awful lot. Sometimes we need to stand in a different place to spot things we haven't perceived before. So the question I'd like to ask you as our new year begins is 'Where and when are you looking out for the Jesus who has been revealed to us?'

A practical step you might take to help you on your way is to sign up to be part of the <u>'Everyday Faith' events</u> that will be happening around our diocese from 29 January until 4 February. The aim of these events is to help us look at our faith afresh and see things anew from some different perspectives.

I'm going to be taking part in the Everyday Faith events and they're going to be great. As we enter a new year, why not come and join me? After all, an invitation to an epiphany isn't something that comes your way every day!

Ring for the King.

For centuries church bells have sounded, calling people to worship, in celebration of special occasions, in remembrance and to mark special events. At Christmas time we are reminded of the importance of bell ringing in these familiar quotes...

These are just a few quotes from familiar Christmas carols and songs which paint a Christmas landscape in our minds. Church bells are such an important feature of this time of year, we can hardly imagine Christmas

without them. However, the bell ringing world needs to train new ringers now to preserve this marvellous British tradition so that future generations can hear the bells on Christmas morning and on all the other important occasions across the year. There are about 6,000 sets of bells across the British Isles, totalling nearly 38,000 bells and only around 30,000 bell-ringers.



Ring for the King – An appeal to recruit more bell ringers in time for the Coronation.

2023 will feature a rare and important occasion in British life - the coronation of King Charles III. The bell ringing community is putting out an appeal to recruit more ringers, so they are trained in time to 'Ring for the King'.

As we establish a band of ringers, here at St. John the Baptist, we would like to play our part and train some new ringers for this important occasion, and we'd like you to consider joining us.

The importance of exercising both body and mind is often spelt out on T.V. and in the media and bell-ringing ticks all the boxes. As a ringer you join a U.K. wide community who will make you welcome wherever you go. And for the more adventurous there are many ringing communities in other countries like Australia, New Zealand, Canada and the US.

Eco Award for Bath and Wells

The Diocese of Bath and Wells has received a bronze Eco Diocese award for its commitment to caring for creation. The award reflects the work undertaken by churches in all parts of the diocese to help take better care of God's world.

Bath and Wells Climate Justice & Environment Adviser, Sara Emmett said, "The Eco Diocese Award means that we have demonstrated our commitment and progress towards Creation Care and Net Zero Carbon as a diocese. In order to progress to a silver award we need to have 30% of churches with an award, 10% of which are silver, so this is our biggest challenge and one which we need everyone to commit to working towards."

FROM THE PARISH PUMP 6th January: Epiphany

On 6th January we celebrate Epiphany - the visit of the Wise Men to the baby Jesus. But who were these Wise Men? No one knows for sure. Matthew calls them 'Magi', and that was the name of an ancient caste of a priestly kind from Persia. It wasn't until the third century that they were called kings - by a church father, Tertullian.

Another church father, Origin, assumed there were three - to correspond with the gifts given.

Later Christian interpretation came to understand gold as a symbol of wisdom and wealth, incense as a symbol of worship and sacrifice, and myrrh as a symbol of healing - and even embalming. Certainly Jesus challenged and set aright the way in which the world handled all three of these things.

Since the 8th century, the Magi have had the names Balthasar, Caspar and Melchior.
