REFLECTION FROM THE VICARAGE

Dear Friends,

I write this reflection, a week after the devastating earthquake across Southern Turkey and Northern Syria. Thousands of lives lost, and buildings brought to rubble and dust. Those who survived are grieving the loss of loved ones, of their homes, possessions, and security. They are also having to endure freezing night temperatures in make shift shelters.



Despite the contorted re-enforced concrete there are glimpses of hope. Signs of life hours after the quake. Neighbour looking out for neighbour. Rescue teams from around the world meeting the immediate need. Emergency health care being offered where possible. Millions of pounds being raised within hours. There is some light amid the darkness.

Closer to home, it is wonderful to see people helping each other out, looking after family members, friends and neighbours. It is also good to help within our wider community, so I am delighted that we, as a church community, are able to support our local foodbank. It is good to see a steady flow of food and other items coming in week by week to help those who need support in our local community. May our generous response last as long as the need! It's a good example of how our individual efforts, which wouldn't make much difference on their own, can be joined to something bigger and make a real difference.

By the time you read this, we shall be into Lent, when I hope that some of us will have joined our Lent group. This is an opportunity, alongside whatever else we may offer to God in terms of self-denial or discipline, to take on the chance to meet with other members of our church community to study scripture, pray and talk about the ways our Christian faith can be a source of blessing, not just to us, but to each other, and the wider world. It will provide us with the opportunity to work out together how our faith shapes our decisions and our lives, so that we can allow our faith to determine and dictate our actions. It may lead us to 'take on' something within the church or our wider community, even something apparently small, which can have a big impact on others. These small acts of kindness can have a huge effect on both giver and receiver, and we should all try hard to encourage one another in all that is good. That is how the kingdom is grown and God is glorified.

This mutual working out of God's purpose in our lives, this grappling with how to be more effective witnesses to God's love in our community and the wider world. this mutual respect and encouragement for each other in our quest to serve God and neighbour better is at the heart of our Christian life together. We have much to learn from each other, and much to offer each other in our Christian discipleship, if we can be encouraged to share. There is much to be gained by being open to other ideas and ways of doing things. We are all pilgrims on the same journey. Let us travel together in love and peace, supporting and encouraging each other along the way as best we can, hearts open to God's Spirit and each other, until we all reach our heavenly Father.

What better way to keep a holy Lent!

FEBRUARY LADIES GROUP MEETING

Hannah from 'Fillerup' in Radstock talked to us about the shop she runs along with her sister, Emily. The shop is Located in what was the butcher's shop attached to the Fromeway Inn.



The opening of the shop was delayed because of the pandemic but eventually opened in October 2020.

Their aim is simply to offer the local community an easy and alternative way to buy great quality, everyday kitchen cupboard staples, household cleaners and beauty products but without any single use plastic and other unnecessary (and usually non-recyclable) packaging that is often the only choice in supermarkets.

Their objective was to reduce household waste and to do this by offering all of the everyday food, cleaning and personal care products you use at home by selling them as refills or in plastic free packaging- reducing the amount of rubbish you end up with. Taking your own containers to refill not only is cheaper but it also helps the hard pressed and threatened environment.

You bring your own containers from home, weigh them on their scales, help yourselves to your product of choice and then weigh again. You then pay for what you've weighed. Easy!

In addition to less packaging waste, the other huge benefit to this way of shopping is that you can buy as much or as little as you want so there is less chance of things going stale or taking up unnecessary space in your cupboards.

Hannah was able to answer numerous questions raised by those present and was thanked for presenting her illustrated talk giving the reasoning into starting 'Fillerup' and what the shop provides.

Hilary was thanked for hosting the meeting.

When we hoe a field'

'When we hoe a field, we all start in this corner and we go this way' is my favourite Zambian proverb. I've been sharing its words with people from our parishes, schools and chaplaincies as a way of inviting us all to think about how our diocesan vision can be refreshed and developed to help us look towards the future with confidence and joy.



Our vision calls us to 'live and tell the story of Jesus'.

It speaks of faith in action. It makes clear that all we do is in the name of Jesus. And it's full of aspiration; living out its words is a life-long task.

But what might our vision mean in terms of what we'd like to focus on specifically? This is where my Zambian proverb comes in. For my sense is that in our common life we would be strengthened if we had a greater focus of what we're all working towards together.

To help us think about this, I'm suggesting four themes that I hope we can all get behind. The aim is not to generate a new initiative, rather it's to identify priorities for our common life upon which we can all focus. Our diverse communities of course mean that anything we do needs to fit local contexts. But I hope the four themes can provide a common framework that will help us all.

Under our overall vision of 'living and telling the story of Jesus', the themes are: (1) Valuing and cherishing the people we already have, (2) Offering worship and sharing our faith together in new and different ways, (3) Developing our own faith and the faith of others. (4) Sharing in ministry and leadership.

I'm inviting everyone to have their say about how these could be developed, adapted or altered. Please do speak with each other and your local church, school and chaplaincy leaders about how this can happen where you are. Please be part of the conversation! Your insights, thoughts and experience are invaluable in helping us think together what it means to 'live and tell the story of Jesus'.

FRIENDSHIP GROUP


At our last meeting we made suggestions for a new programme. This will be completed when we get replies from speakers and then we can post a 'What's on' for members to consider.

The meeting to elect two churchwardens will be held immediately before the APCM.

The APCM is a chance for all church members to receive the Annual Report and Accounts for 2022 and an opportunity for anyone to raise questions and to comment on what the Officers and PCC have done during the year.

Churchwardens are elected annually and their term of office is for one year.

PCC representatives are elected to serve a three year term of office. Three people need to be elected to serve from 2023 to 2026 and one to serve from 2023 to 2024.

2023 is the year that Deanery Synod Representatives are elected to serve a three year term. The number of representatives is governed by the number on the electoral roll. As the number on our electoral roll has dropped below 100 we are now entitled to two representatives.

Please speak to Father Guy, the churchwardens or the PCC Secretary if you are interested in taking up one of these positions.

FRONT COVER - FICE'S WELL

Near Two Bridges, on Dartmoor

One version of the story about this well tells how in the days of Good Queen Bess, Sir John Fitz and his wife were riding across the Moor when they became quite disoriented in a thick mist (most common even on a good day on Dartmoor).

They were tired, hungry and thirsty when they came across a spring of clear water. They dismounted to have a drink. As soon as they had quenched their thirst the mist cleared. They recognized their surroundings and were able to head towards home - Fitzford House, near Tavistock.

In gratitude Sir John later retuned and had the spring walled and covered as you see in the picture. On the front edge of the canopy are his initials, I.F. and the date 1568, although weathering have made the lettering almost illegible. The outer wall was built later to protect the well from cattle.
