

Reflections from the Vicarage

Dear Friends,

As we celebrate and share in Harvest Thanksgivings at church and elsewhere in our community. It is vitally important that we take time, formally, once a year, to reflect on all God's goodness to us and to thank him for all his many blessings to us. We are so blessed in so



many ways, and there is a real danger that we just take it all for granted. Nowadays, even in a place like Midsomer Norton, most of us have lost the vitality of the link between Harvest and survival/prosperity in the year ahead. Maybe that is why we have also lost some of that sense of living gratitude for what we have. I well remember during my years in farming the feelings of exhaustion, relief and gratitude as we brought the Harvest home, knowing that its success or otherwise could make or break us the following year.

Farming, of course is never about the 'one-off' or short-termism. Planning, preparation and sheer hard-graft all have vital parts to play in maximising the potential for a good return. After that though we really do have to leave it to God, praying that he will take our planning, our preparation and our work and will multiply them and bless them, so that our harvest will yield plenty for us and for others.

Harvest is a time for each and every one of us, to be encouraged first to 'count our blessings', to give thanks for them and then to think seriously and prayerfully about what our response as Christians, as followers of Christ, should be. How do we use the money, time and talents that have been given to us? Does our gratitude overflow and make us generous in our giving? How does what we give to God through the work of his church compare to other things we spend our money on? A loaf of bread, a pint of beer, a meal out, a weekend away? It is said that a quick look at our bank statements shows what we value and find important in life!

What would a stranger looking at ours conclude about our lives, our priorities and our beliefs? It's a question worth asking. There should be a clear match between what we say we value and believe and where our money goes!

Now I know as well as anyone that not everyone has limitless incomes and that times are hard. But we can be too cautious in our giving! Part of our calling as Christians is to give sacrificially, to make (sometimes hard) choices about where we spend our money. To go without something we'd like, so that others may have what they need. This is an important part of our calling to live in faith. Living in faith also encourages us not to be anxious about our lives. What we have and don't have can so easily take over our lives. Jesus tells us not to worry, to leave it to our heavenly Father who does and will provide generously for us.

God gives us everything we need in extravagant abundance. Let us give in the same way!

Clandown Church Memory

Colin Hunt writes:

This photograph of Clandown Church priest and choir was taken, I believe, around 1880.

The crucifer is my great-grandfather,

John George Almond (b. 1859).

He lived in Clandown for almost his entire life, passing away in Mount Pleasant on October 29th, 1923. The flowers in St. John's on October 29th, 2023 are to be given in his memory to mark the centenary of his passing.

What an opportunity!

This week I was on a Zoom chat with some of our chaplains around the diocese. I meet regularly with eight or nine of them alongside our Chaplaincy Development Adviser Mike Haslam. These are only a few of the more than 300 chaplains we have, of all ages, lay and ordained, across Bath and Wells.

There are more and more enquiries about chaplaincy from a wide range of communities. They are seeking a chaplain to offer pastoral care and well-being support for an increasingly stressed and anxious workforce. One particular enquiry caught my attention this week.

A local Further Education college has been saying that their first concern is for a chaplain to address the spiritual exploration of its students. What an opportunity! We know from the Talking Jesus research (2015 and 2022) that most practising Christians come to faith before the age of 18. Several of our schools, including primary, have pupil chaplains now and this is a great way of recognising that you are never too young to start in living and telling the story of Jesus!

As a child I was always struck by the Old Testament story of the unnamed little slave girl who served Naaman's wife, (2 Kings chapter 5). Taken from her home to another country, and placed in an alien environment, she was the one who introduced Naaman to Elisha the prophet in Israel. As a result, Naaman overcame his scepticism, was healed from his leprosy, and discovered a faith in God.

Chaplaincy opens up a diversity of contexts in which we can share our faith and I invite you to pray for those here in Bath and Wells who are treading new ground to open up the way for others to discover the love of Jesus for themselves.

However, each one of us has our own possibility of being a chaplain, coming alongside another in our daily life and community. Sometimes our timidity prevents us from speaking up about faith and our personal spiritual journey other than in church where we are known and on familiar territory.

How about taking some time to reflect on where you might live and tell the story of Jesus outside of church, in your everyday context? Is there someone, like a Naaman's wife who is desperate to find help and hope for a loved one but doesn't know where to find it? Maybe you are the only one who could tell them!

From the Diocese— Manna mailing Beach baptism for Jacob


On a sunny Sunday in the summer, the community of St. Peter's, Portishead gathered for the baptism of youth member Jacob.



FROM THE PARISH PUMP

Bible Sunday – 29th October

At the recent Coronation the King was given a Bible with the words 'the most valuable thing that this world affords'. As Bible Sunday is celebrated this month, let's ask why we should read the Bible?

The Bible isn't a single book, but a library of 66 books, composed by some 44 writers over 1500 years in a range of styles including history, poetry, prophecy, letters and apocalyptic (looking at the end times).

Despite having a number of different writers, it claims one authority - God Himself! 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (2 Timothy 3:16). The Bible is inspired ('the word of God in the words of men') and equips us to live for God in every aspect of our lives. We also have the promise of the Holy Spirit to guide us when we read: 'when the Spirit of truth comes, He will guide you into all truth' (John 16:13).

How should we read the Bible? Let's consider the following guidelines:

Right time: We need a regular routine, which will meet our needs. This will vary according to our circumstances: e.g., a mum at home with young children, somebody with a demanding job or a retired person.

Right Place: We need to find a space where we can be undisturbed (e.g. lounge, bedroom, train or kitchen).

Right Version: We need a version of the Bible which we can readily understand and use. A number of versions are available (e.g. NIV, The Message), as well as Bible apps we can access on our phone.

Right Help: Reading notes also help us to understand a passage and apply it to our lives.



TOWER TOURS

As part of the Midsomer Norton Heritage Open Days, on the afternoon of Sunday 10th September, the church was open for people to look around the building. Visitors were given the opportunity to climb the 100 steps to the roof of the tower.

The weather was good for the event, maybe a little too warm for Guy, Philip and Kate who did a tremendous job of escorting people on the journey to the top. Part way up, there was a pause for people to get their breath and also for them to view the bells.

Strict rules were in force with regard to health & safety. A group of hopefuls were disappointed when told they couldn't go up as they were not wearing appropriate footwear. Keen not to miss this chance, they went home and came back in suitable footwear!!

Pat Marriott had spent a lot of time researching history of the church (helped by the information from the book written by Tony Daniels) and had produced a time-line going back to 1086. This was accompanied by numerous photos many featuring incumbents.

Refreshments were available and enjoyed by both the tower climbers and others who had come just to look around the building.

In total, 70 people were taken up the tower in 9 groups. Of these, 25 were in the 8-17 age range, 20 in the 18-50 and 25 over 50's.

A couple of comments heard 'I was christened here' and from someone who was in the over 50's age category 'I haven't been in here since I attended St John's School'

The afternoon, although not intended to be a fund raising event, raised over £100 in donations. A big thank you to all who helped make the event such a success.
