Reflections from the Ministry Team

Dear Friends,

There can be a feeling that with Christmas coming every year and the story being known so well, that there's nothing new to be said or discovered. This I believe to be a serious error. We should always be



looking afresh at our faith and making new discoveries.

Sometimes we can do this by taking a different slant, looking for something different, or approaching it in a different way.

The themes of generosity and remembering can be sought and found in the Christmas story. The unspeakable generosity of God in freely giving his Son to redeem the world, the generosity of Mary and Joseph in saying 'yes' to their part in God's plan, the generosity of the Wise Men and the Shepherds in their gift-giving to the Christ-child, the generosity of the hospitality shown. And the theme of remembering is also readily to be found; not perhaps initially, or even as events were happening, but in the piecing together of the story, in the reflection of what it all might mean, both then and now. The referring back to the Jewish scriptures, the pondering of Mary in her heart, the putting of two and two together of Joseph, the shepherds and the Wise Men.

So, as we 'revisit', to greater or lesser extent, the world-changing story of the birth of Jesus, what should we expect? I suggest that in order to enter fully into the drama, the only thing we should expect is the unexpected! Just as the original participants were surprised, amazed, perplexed, awe-struck, fearful and bewildered by events as they unfurled, so should we be open, as they were, to new possibilities and truths. As we remember again the story of God's Incarnation, let us take time to consider our response. The participants in the original story responded with generosity and faith to their part in God's great plan. How do we respond to God's part for us in his great plans today?

What does Christmas really mean to us? Is it just a story, so familiar to us that it has lost its impact? Or is it a story that we look at afresh in our remembering each and every year, eagerly seeking new insights and new messages for us here and now? Are we prepared, like the original participants, to let ourselves be changed forever by those events more than two thousand years ago? That, I believe, is the challenge to us all; our response, and the implications of that response. How thankful do we really feel? How generous will we be as a result of our gratitude? Is our memory of the events a passive acknowledgement of what happened, or does it fire and inspire us to do new things for God?

I pray that this may be for all of us a blessed, meaning-filled, life-changing Christmas, and that our excitement, joy and sense of wonder may be shared by all those whom we joyfully welcome to St. John's at this special time of year, when heaven and earth are joined, and when we welcome once again the Christ-child into our lives, our families, our work and our hearts.


A unique step of faith

Christmas Cards in Church 2023

Church Clock

For some considerable time, the mechanism for striking the hour on the Church clock has not been working. No servicing has been done on the clock for many years.


There is no top on the clock case, so when the ringing room walls were brushed down several years ago, dust fell into the clock works.

Inspections have been carried out by two clock companies and estimates for the work needed were received.

The PCC have agreed that as a public time piece the work should be done and investigations of how to cover the costs are being researched.

Two anonymous donors have already offered to help with the cost should the work go ahead.





Why do people hang wreaths for Christmas?

It is believed that the holly wreath, with its sharp, pointed leaves, represents the crown of thorns worn by Christ on the Cross and the tiny red berries represent the drops of blood.

When a wreath is hung on the door, it is viewed as an invitation for Christ and the spirit of Christmas to enter into their home.

A unique story

When I speak to my Mum on my birthday, she often recalls to me the events that surrounded my arrival in the world. These include nearly being born in the hospital lift, my older brother being smuggled in to see me under my dad's overcoat and of various aunts sneaking onto the maternity ward out of visiting hours by wearing their WRVS uniforms.




Each of us has a unique story about our birth. At Christmas we'll be recounting once again the story that we share about another birth - the birth of Jesus. Across the world we'll be re-telling and re-enacting what happened in Bethlehem more than 2000 years ago. We'll recall the journey of Mary and Joseph, the birth in the stable, the arrival of the shepherds, the song of the angels, the visit of the Magi.

Our own birth stories are unique to each of us. Jesus's is common to us all. And not just because we all know about it. For in our recollection of Jesus' birth, we'll also be remembering that that in him, God came to be at one with us. In Jesus God arrived to share fully in our humanity, experiencing complete solidarity with every aspect of our human condition. Jesus is 'God with us' — in trenches in Ukraine, bomb shelters in Israel and Gaza, in hospital wards where loved ones die, in relationships where there is conflict and distress.

Just as much as he is with us in our greatest joys and our deepest woes, Jesus is also for us. One of the earliest teachers of the Church said this: 'He became what we are so that we might become what he is.' The baby born in Bethlehem stands with us not only in all that we experience. This child also comes to offer us the possibility of opening every part of our lives to the transforming power of God's life of love and joy and peace. He comes so that every day we can become a little more like him.

This is the good news of Christmas and may it be yours this year.

FROM THE PARISH PUMP

24 December Christmas Eve

How do you celebrate Christmas Eve? It has its own customs, the most popular of which is going to Midnight Mass, or the Christ-Mas. This is the only Mass of the year that is allowed to start after sunset. In Catholic countries such as Spain, Italy and Poland, Midnight Mass is in fact the most important church service of the entire Christmas season, and many people traditionally fast beforehand. In other countries, such as Belgium and Denmark, people dine during the evening, and then go on to the Midnight Service.

The British are behind some countries when it comes to exchanging presents: in Germany, Sweden and Portugal the custom is to exchange on Christmas Eve. But the British are ahead of Serbia and Slovakia, where the Christmas tree is not even brought into the house and decorated until Christmas Eve.

Yule logs are not so popular since the decline of the fireplace, but traditionally it was lit on Christmas Eve from a bit of the previous year's log, and then would be burned non-stop until 12th Night (6th January). Tradition also decreed that any greenery such as holly, ivy or mistletoe must wait until Christmas Eve until being brought into the house.
