Dear Friends,

Autumn colour and fruitfulness comes with much to celebrate. This year's Harvest Thanksgiving was particularly joyful as we were joined once again by pupils from St John's School. They helped tell the story of a foolish farmer and led our prayers of intercession beautifully.



As the season progresses the mood pauses to look back. November brings a long look over our shoulders to times of loss and sacrifice. Nature retreats before our eyes as autumn speeds toward the darkest time of the year. For some this time brings a heaviness of heart. The joy and light of December, crowned by our Christmas festivities is still some time off as a reflective mood takes hold.

That heaviness of heart can be deepened by the tragedies and suffering we witness daily on the news. Our hearts can break at the suffering we witness. Feelings of powerlessness can confound us as we struggle to see what we can do to make things better.

Our faith calls us to action, to be the hands of Christ in the world. But for many the ways and means to act feel insignificant or at best limited. We may donate what we can spare to good causes and to those who can act on our behalf, but what else can we do? Well we can pray. In company or alone, we can articulate our pain and hopes, beseeching strength, expressing our love and giving thanks. Each Sunday members of our congregation do just that by leading our prayers of intercession at our Parish Eucharist. They are an important part of our collective prayer life. They are particularly enriched when they reflect a range of voices. Shared widely, they reflect our community and our diversity, as we come together before God, expressing our hopes and thanks each week.

On Saturday 4th **November** we will be having a refresher meeting for those who currently lead our Sunday intercessions. It's also a chance for those of you who may be thinking of joining our regular team to find out what it entails.

Each time we come out of the silence we bring a little more stillness into our world, a little more of Christ's love, a little more peace. And of all the gifts we and our world need at this time, surely peace is most needed.

Our next Silent Prayer meeting will take place at **4pm on Sunday 19**th **November**. Held in God's loving embrace, we will rest and listen, exploring the silence together. Why not come and join us?

Time to re-member

I am shortly leaving Bath and Wells for a time to serve as interim Acting Diocesan Bishop in the Diocese of Coventry. You may know that the city of Coventry saw some very heavy shelling during World War 2, which resulted in the destruction of the Cathedral.



A new Cathedral has since been built and stands alongside the old ruin as a testament of hope. Though different in style, there's a harmony of old and new. It shows us where conflict can destroy, peace can be found as we seek to live together as the people of God.

This marrying of modern and traditional styles of architecture, helps us to consider how we fashion the life we are called to live as Christians in our communities. It is not that we put aside our differences nor require others to conform to our own shape or form. Rather we recognise the value of listening fully to others and learn to hear the voice of God. Determining to value the worth of each contribution and discerning together a faithful walk with God.

This season of Remembrance encourages us to look back and to value the contributions of those who have gone before us, giving their lives in the service of others. It is not about glorifying the concept of war and conflict but the desire to establish a peaceful world for all. As we look back, so we are invited to look forward and commit to establishing a world where all have a place and where the Prince of Peace, Jesus, is our example.

Coventry is the home to the Community of the Cross of Nails. A community of reconciliation based around the cross fashioned by iron nails found within the ruins of the Cathedral following the fire. Its mission is to live out the practice of peace-building, encouraging people across the world to learn to be reconciled with themselves and one another, as they find reconciliation with God, through Christ.

As I leave here, I do so with plenty of memories, many happy, occasionally sad. Often the latter are those where I have got things wrong and failed to live up to my calling to be the grace-filled child of God I long to be. So, if I have let you down, I am sorry and please pray for me, as I will for you, that God continues to reconcile us to Himself and to one another.

And as we hold our acts of remembrance this month, may we become *re-membered* (put back together), as the people of God.


Gregory's passion is opera and he hopes to pursue this as a career along with performing recitals as he did for us.

Some news from St John's Primary School & Nursery

At Next Steps Nursery we love to read!

This term we have been learning about autumn and have shared the story 'Pumpkin soup.' This is a lovely story about friendship and how important it is to work together. The children then explored real pumpkins, scooping out the seeds, mixing other 'ingredients' from the mud kitchen and pretended to make their own pumpkin soup!

Learning in Year 1

As part of our learning in English in term 1, Year 1 visited Midsomer Norton Library. We enjoyed two lovely stories being read to us by the librarians. Both stories were about libraries and how fabulous books are. They made us laugh! After the stories, we each spent time choosing a book to borrow and take back to school for the rest of the term.

It has been lovely hearing all the different stories during story time in class and sharing facts from the non fiction books too! We have also been basing our writing on the book 'The Train Ride' by June Creebin. We have been learning how to use adjectives and how to expand our sentences to add interest by using the conjunction 'and'.

To immerse them in the story we have researched the common barn owl, created our own fireworks pictures and even had our very own campfire, complete with toasted marshmallows, hot chocolate and campfire songs!

The children have used all of these experiences to help them in their independent writing with some fantastic results.

A new kind of Remembrance Poppy


For the first time in 28 years, there is a new kind of poppy for Remembrance Sunday this year: it is plastic free.

Director of the Poppy Appeal, Andy Taylor-Whyte explains: "We are very proud to introduce the plastic-free poppy. It will not only enable people to support our Armed Forces community but also continues the Royal British Legion's commitment to sustainability."



Available from October 2023, the new poppy is made from an innovative blend of renewable fibres from responsible sources and can be recycled in ordinary paper recycling collections.

The new poppy has been three years in the development and making. The aim was to reduce the use of single-use plastic and to "be economical, sustainable, and less impactful to the environment."



The new poppy design has a 40% smaller carbon footprint, and it made from "bespoke red and green paper." The paper comes from a blend of renewable fibres, 50 per cent of which has been recovered from the waste used in the production of coffee cups.

The plastic-free poppy will be available alongside remaining stocks of the current poppy, to reduce any waste of poppies already produced. Poppies containing single-use plastic can be returned to Sainsbury's stores for recycling.

Happy Birthday, King Charles!

King Charles was born 75 years ago this month, on 14th November 1948, at Buckingham Palace in London. He was the longest-serving monarch-in-waiting in British history and did not ascend the throne until he was 73, following the death of his mother in September 2022.



Charles was crowned in the first coronation in seven decades, on 6th May 2023. His current title is King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

But King Charles has also become head of the Commonwealth, an association of 56 independent countries and 2.5 billion people. For 14 of these countries, as well as the UK, the King is head of state. These countries are known as the Commonwealth realms. They are Australia, Antigua and Barbuda, the Bahamas, Belize, Canada, Grenada, Jamaica, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, St Christopher and Nevis, St Lucia, St Vincent and the Grenadines, Solomon Islands, and Tuvalu.
