Reflections from the Ministry Team

Alleluia. Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia.

Dear Friends,

You will read this just days after the wonderful celebration of Resurrection life, hope and love.

So may I wish you all a very happy Easter.



The events of Holy Week reflect the story of our human history in microcosm. Holy Week reveals failure, separation, struggle, exhaustion, betrayal, darkness and death matched by the faithful love of our creator, the self-giving grace of his Son, and the final victory of light and love. As Christians, when we travel with Christ through these events, we should find ourselves overwhelmed by Resurrection joy and hope on Easter Day.

Reading the accounts of these events in the Gospels, and in particular in Matthew, Mark and Luke, we find at the heart of the story of the resurrection these words, 'He is not here.' The tomb is empty, 'He is not here,' the sorrowing women are told as they come to anoint a corpse. How must they have felt at that moment, their hopes shattered, stricken with grief and totally exhausted, confused and muddled, even angry – perhaps someone had taken Jesus' body, friend or foe. It was all just too much to bear. Then an angel addresses them 'Do not be alarmed; He is not here. He is risen,' and so they go, bewildered and excited, to tell the disciples.

'He is not here. He is risen.' There, in seven words, is the heart of the Easter faith, for what was true of Jesus is true for all those whose faith is in the risen Lord. Death is not the end, Resurrection opens the way to be with Christ. That is our hope, our joy and God's Good News.

Christianity is an Easter faith, and Christians are an Easter people. If this is true, then we should all be full of Easter joy, hope and good news because we are celebrating the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. Through our Lord's Resurrection the old order of sin and death has been overcome and our relationship with God restored.

The abundant unconditional generosity of God's love for us is shown supremely in the Crucifixion and Resurrection of His only Son, Jesus Christ, our Saviour. 'God **so** loved the world, that he gave his only-begotten Son, to the end that all that believe in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.'

The great Easter acclamation, "Alleluia. Christ is risen." "He is risen indeed. Alleluia" echoes the words of the angel to the first witnesses on the first Easter morning 'He is not here. He is risen.'

As witnesses to the Resurrection in our day, as Easter people, we cry with joy, 'He is not here. He is risen.'

So go - and tell!

News in brief from Bath & Wells Diocesan Manna Mailing

Bishop Michael to visit Zambia

Bishop Michael will be making his first visit to Zambia as Bishop of Bath and Wells this month, having previously spent time there during his career as an epidemiologist.

Commenting on his visit, which takes place from 22 April to 5 May 2024, Bishop Michael says, "I am really looking forward to be going back to Zambia. It takes the whole world to know Christ and I'm so excited at the thought of all I will learn from our Zambian brothers and sisters. I am also looking forward to the opportunity to explore how we can potentially work together on a joint environmental project involving our schools."

Cathedral admission changes

Wells Cathedral has announced changes to its admission guidelines from 22 April. Free passes are available to local people and to parishioners in the Diocese of Bath and Wells, with a new entry charge for tourists.

You can obtain a Wells Cathedral Parish Pass if you are on the electoral roll of a parish church in the Diocese of Bath and Wells.

If you would like to apply for a Parish Pass, please complete the form downloaded from the website with your churchwarden and take it to the Welcome Desk in Wells Cathedral between 9am and 4.30pm (11am to 3pm Sundays) in order to collect your pass.

It will remain free to enter for worship, prayer, and to light a candle. The monies raised by the £14 tourist admission charge will go towards the care of the cathedral building and its mission.

The meeting to elect two churchwardens will be held immediately before the APCM.

The APCM is a chance for all church members to receive the Annual Report and Accounts for 2023 and an opportunity for anyone to raise questions and to comment on what the Officers and PCC have done during the year.

Churchwardens are elected annually to serve for one year. The current churchwardens are both willing to stand for re-election.

PCC representatives are elected to serve a three year term of office. Three people need to be elected to serve from 2024 to 2027. Two members, whose term of office comes to an end at the APCM, are willing to be re-elected. One person is needed to fill the vacancy arising from the retirement of the third representative

Please speak to Father Guy, the churchwardens or the PCC Secretary if you are interested in taking up one of these positions.

Colour in all the fish

ST GEORGES DAY 23RD APRIL

Who was St George? Here are some facts that may surprise you about England's patron saint...

1. By George, he's not even English! St George was actually born in Cappadocia, Turkey, around 270AD.



2. But he was a soldier...

St George was a high-ranking officer in the Roman army who protested against the Romans' torture of Christians. Roman emperor Diocletian ordered his death for failing to recant his faith. And that's how he became a Christian martyr.

3. Two Kings helped him become England's patron saint

Edward I was a crusader and reigned from 1272-1307. He was fond of St George. His troops wore the St George's cross to fight the Welsh. In 1300, he also raised the St George's flag over Caerlaverock Castle in Scotland.

His grandson, Edward III reigned from 1327 to 1377. He heard stories from returning crusaders of St George's bravery. By the 14th century, St George was seen as a special protector of the English. So when Edward founded England's Knights of the Garter, there was only one choice for patron. Later in 1415, George was named official patron saint of England.

4. He is not just England's patron saint

He is also patron saint of countries like Ethiopia, Georgia and Portugal. George was seen as an especially powerful intercessor, using prayer on behalf of others.

5. Shakespeare and St George share something in common

It is not the fact that they are both 'English' heroes. The answer is that both died on 23rd April. This date is also believed to be Shakespeare's birthday.

Bishop's letter – Worship is key From Michael Langrish, Assistant Bishop for Bath and Wells

In January I was back in my old Diocese of Exeter, marking the death of Sabine Baring Gould 100 years before. What an extraordinary person he was, with an incredible range and roundedness of learning and interests, in an equally full and fulfilled life. He was a



great traveller and prolific writer of biographies, folklore, travel books, theology, novels and hymns, including some, such as 'Onward Christian soldiers' that remain popular today. He was a linguist and translator; and, as an archaeologist on Dartmoor, very much a pioneer in the field.

For many, his greatest achievement was his collecting the old folk songs of Devon and Cornwall, providing inspiration for such composers as Elgar, Vaughan Williams and Holst. He was also the Squire of Lewtrenchard and, being ordained, he appointed himself as parish priest as well!

This he saw as his true vocation. His responsibility, and that of the local church, was the cure of souls from cradle to grave. This meant a care for the spiritual wellbeing of all in the community and for their bodily and social welfare too. Striving for good health and housing must go hand in hand with growth in faith and prayer. All should be encouraged to full humanity, to holy discipleship, to the recognition and use, of whatever gifts anyone possessed for the common good.

But, underlying all of this, one other aspect of this great man's life speaks very strongly to me now. That is how he understood worship and its relationship to the whole of life. 'To worship is to quicken the conscience by the holiness of God, to feed the mind with the truth of God, to purge the imagination by the beauty of God, to open the heart to the love of God, to devote the will to the purpose of God'.

The current edition of Manna (see below) it contains encouraging stories of New Christian Worshipping Communities in Bath and Wells. Worshipping is key. I am reminded of the later words of Archbishop William Temple: 'It is sometimes said that conduct is supremely important, and worship helps it. The truth is that worship is supremely important, and conduct tests it.'

They said, "We wanted to offer a way to access worship for those who aren't drawn to worship in a church building and we've already got a core group of families who come every month. Even when it poured with rain the other Sunday and we thought no one would turn up, they did, which is a very encouraging sign for the future."
