

Reflections from the Ministry Team

Dear Friends,

During the *Great Fifty Days of Easter*, from Easter Day until Pentecost, we celebrate the transformative power of God's love, its ability to bring triumph from disaster, hope from despair. On Good Friday all is lost, Jesus dead, his disciples hiding and dreams of the coming



Kingdom shattered. Yet here we are today, two thousand years later, followers of Christ, Easter people. Good Friday was not the end, though at the time it must have felt as though it was.

One of the Christian values which underpin our school's ethos is *hope*. Each year pupils hear reflections and stories that demonstrate that hope is *the belief that things will get better*. Our hopes may not be fulfilled in the way we had imagined but as Easter shows, disastrous starts are misleading. As *Easter people* Christians are called to live hope-filled lives, demonstrating our faith, our faith that things will get better, no matter how it may appear.

And that can be a severe challenge. Many of us have come to limit our intake of daily news, so much is the despair that regularly pulls at our hearts. Images of limp young bodies being pulled from rubble in Gaza, reports of another roadside shrine for a victim of knife crime, charity advertisements revealing the cruelty inflicted on our fellow creatures. But Christian's are *people of hope*. As Easter people we know that things can be transformed. We are called to be part of that transformation, through prayer, through hospitality and generosity, and through social action.

The Christian season of Easter comes to an end at Pentecost, and eleven days later the month of May nears its end with the feast of Corpus Christi where we give thanks for the institution of the Eucharist, the sacrament that makes Christ tangible for many. Until then the month of May calls us to share our springtime Easter hope.

The May trees that seem to blossom rather earlier each year, have long been associated with hope. Hawthorn flowers have been symbolic of hope since ancient times. What greater symbolism can there be that such blossom springs amid such vicious thorns, thorns suitable for a Saviour's crown. And in time this spring blossom will fruit with winter sustaining berries.

Bishop's Letter A Challenge Offered

There's a fascinating exercise I've often undertaken with roomfuls of church members. I've asked them the question 'To what age do you trace back the beginnings of your Christian faith?' The results are almost always the same. About



40% of us think that our Christian journey started at some point before the age of four. Another 40% of us trace the beginnings of our faith back to when we were less than eleven. A further 20% say before we were eighteen. While only one in five of us report having embarked on the journey of faith as adults.


The findings I've described should give us all pause for thought. For most people, the start of our Christian journey (even if we've dropped out for a while in adolescence and early adulthood) starts in childhood.

So if we want to grow our churches and transform our communities this suggests that it's into the faith development of children and young people that we should be putting our energies, priority and resources.

Our data suggests that more than half our churches have no young person worshipping with them on a Sunday morning. I realise, of course, how hard it is for churches to compete with the demands of football, seeing the extended family, doing any of the many things that are otherwise crowded out of busy family lives. Yet experience shows that when we offer worship at other times and in formats that are attractive to children, young people and families they do come.

This year I'm challenging all our benefices to grow their average weekly attendance by one child (net). If we could sustain such an achievement over a number of years the impact would transform our churches, our lives and our experience. The support services of our diocese offer extensive assistance to enable local churches to think what could work with the resources you have, the passions and skills you possess and the reality of the situation where you are. Do ask for their help.

Are you willing to take up the challenge I've offered?




News in Brief from the Diocese

Week of Prayer for Children and young People: 1 – 7 July

During the first week of July, the Go Team are hosting a week of prayer for children and young people and are inviting churches across our diocese to join in. A Prayer Guide for the week will be available on the diocesan website. There are themes for each day plus creative prayer ideas for using at home, in small groups and in church services.

Go Team Adviser, Andy Levett commented "We'll be gathering to pray for half an hour each day and we'd love you to do the same wherever you are and at a time that suits you."



Christian Aid Week 2024 - 12-18 May

Seven days, so many ways to make a difference.



Every Christian Aid Week, people across Britain and Ireland raise funds, act and pray for their global neighbours in a celebration of hope for a fairer world.

This year's appeal runs from 12–18 May and is focussing on the organisation's work in Burundi, one of the most densely populated and poorest countries in Africa.

Heavily reliant on agriculture, it's also one of the least prepared to combat the effects of climate change, including droughts, floods and landslides.

The global cost of living crisis has intensified the challenges: more than 70 per cent of the population live in poverty and more than half of children are chronically malnourished.

Christian Aid has been working in Burundi since 1995 when it first offered humanitarian assistance to people surviving the civil conflict.

Father Philip's APCM Report on School work 2023-4

In the past year we have developed an increasingly close relationship with our church school, St John's CE Primary. The familiar pattern of term-time, whole-school, week day services in church at Harvest, Christmas and Easter has continued, each time the church is filled with children, staff and parents/carers. At the Easter Service Reception children now regularly present us with an Easter garden to be placed in our altar.

Clergy from St John's also lead regular weekly collective worship in school on Wednesdays. With such a large school, (400+) this weekly commitment makes for a substantial part of our outreach work.

Last year's Patronal festival kick-started school involvement in the church's festival worship. We were fortunate to be joined by the new school choir. During the year the school choir has been developing a repertoire of powerful songs that they perform with gusto. We are delighted that they will be performing a lunchtime concert in church in the summer term.

Since last year's Patronal Festival the school's Ethos Committee and staff have contributed intercessions and readings at Harvest, Fr Philip's Licensing and on Mothering Sunday. This year children from the school came to church to make and distribute the posies.

At Christmas, children from the school contributed a tree for our Christmas Tree Festival, at its close all came to the church to see the wonderful display. Our regular Christmas Crib Service numbers have continued to increase each year. This year we led a Christingle Service in church after school for families from St John's School. Money was raised for The Children's Society. The Christingles were lovingly made by church volunteers at our Tuesday Coffee morning.

St John's is not the only school we now have involvement with. We now make termly visits to Midsomer Norton Primary to take assembly and Norton Hill Primary regularly invites us to teach pupils about Christmas and Easter. Classes at St John's also receive teaching from us at these times. This coming year we would like to increase contact with Welton and Longvernal Primary Schools. Welton and MSNP regularly visit the church as part of their RE studies.

An important part of our focus this past year has been through involvement with a diocesan initiative called *Launchpad*. Through it we hope to develop some kind of support for pupils moving on to secondary school. What shape that takes will be up to pupils in Y6, who we are currently working with in church twice every term. They come to spend time in their church, to talk and share, to reflect and learn, and experience our hospitality...especially cake! Mrs Marshall's baking has found a new and enthusiastic market! Staff and pupils have valued the sessions and we hope to make this a regular part of each pupil's final year at St John's.

At the end of the year, our Y6 children will prepare to move on to secondary school. Our hope is that in some way St John's remains their church, and that some kind of regular contact can be fostered. What form that will take, whether it involves us visiting them, or vice versa will be up to them.

Other recent developments have included the start of a school based afterschool drama club, the appointment of a new school governor (Fr Philip) and a new school librarian (Pat Marriott).

And finally a request, please be wary of judging our work with young people purely by what you see in church between 10-11am on a Sunday morning. Things are happening, seeds are being sown and progress is being made. Thank you.
