#### Reflections from the Ministry Team

#### Dear friends,

As autumn reaches its peak and edges ever closer toward winter, the liturgical year and our cultural calendar turns our minds to the people and events of the past; the heroes we celebrate on *All Saints Day*, the souls we commemorate on *All Souls Day*, the audacity



of the *Gunpowder Plot*, and the fallen and sacrifice of *Remembrance*. The end of the month prepares us for the start of a new liturgical year as we celebrate Christ's Kingdom before Advent turns the page.

But this month is far more than an exercise in looking back. November is a closing act that invites us to *come together* and see ourselves as part of something far greater than ourselves. This is no time to recall in isolation. This is the time to join with others, those in our here and now, and those who have gone before and are yet to come. This time reminds us of our mutual belonging. As Christians we are reminded that we are not solitary. From baptism we become part of the body of Christ on earth and members of a body of faith that transcends time and space.

All Saint's Day and All Souls Day both celebrate this mutual belonging. Remembrance explores this further, as our corporate and personal memories turn to issues of war and peace, loss and self-giving, memory and forgetting. The feast of Christ the King closes our liturgical year with the reassurance of Christ's ultimate victory over all that mars God's creation.

This is the time to *come together*, to draw strength from one another, to be one body. That call to unity as the body of Christ is particularly resonant for us here at St John's.

This month's magazine includes the rationale recently presented to our PCC and the PCCs of the Benefice of East Mendip Trinity (Holcombe, Coleford and Kilmersdon with Babington) which outlines a way forward for us all, in what are challenging times for individual churches.

The proposal was accepted by all of the PCCs and in the New Year our parishes will begin a new journey together. It will no doubt be a time of challenge as well as opportunity. But let us listen to the season and remember that we are called to *come together* and to be part of something far greater than ourselves.

This time of year naturally gathers us as the body of Christ, so let us draw strength from our shared inheritance as we close one page and prepare to open another.

### This proposal was unanimously accepted by our PCC at its last meeting.

#### Proposed ministry arrangement for St John's Midsomer Norton & East Mendip Trinity Benefice (Coleford, Holcombe and Kilmersdon with Babington)

For consideration by the PCCs of these parishes. 24th September (joint meeting for East Mendip Trinity) and1st October (Midsomer Norton)

Since the retirement of the Revd Clarissa Cridland, East Mendip Trinity has been in a clergy vacancy while the Deanery Mission and Pastoral Group (DMPG) considers the future shape of ministry in Midsomer Norton.

After careful and prayerful consideration, the DMPG now proposes that: East Mendip Trinity joins with Midsomer Norton Parish under the ministry of the Revd Guy Scott.

The DMPG and the Archdeacon did weigh up a number of possible options before making this proposal. This option was chosen because:

- A good fit between the tradition and style of the two benefices. Other possible partners would be a less obvious fit.
- Some members of the St John's clergy team have been taking services in East Mendip Trinity this year, so this will give continuity.
- This allows other reorganisations to take place elsewhere in the Deanery in the future. It's important to understand that this is part of a whole deanery review which will affect other parishes too, and is intended to put all the churches of the Deanery on a sustainable footing.
- There are also financial benefits which are explained in more detail below.

How this will happen: It is proposed that Guy will be licensed as Priest in Charge of East Mendip Trinity, in addition to his existing role as Vicar of Midsomer Norton. This is quicker and simpler than going through a full pastoral reorganisation. It does mean that we will continue with two separate benefices for the time being, sharing an incumbent. In the event of a future clergy vacancy, if the arrangement is working well, it is envisaged that we would join the four parishes into one benefice.

In the immediate future, it is expected that the four parishes will work "as if" a benefice, building up a relationship and exploring the benefits of being part of a bigger group.

How ministry will be shared across the whole group: This is the most obvious change that people in the churches will experience, and we can share some initial thoughts about this at the PCC meetings. In practice though, this is something to be worked out between the incumbent, the ministry team and the churchwardens once we agree to go ahead.

Finance: There is a financial benefit to this arrangement. As the common fund is now based on a "benefice share" system, St John's is currently being asked to pay a whole share on its own, while East Mendip Trinity is also paying a share (albeit a smaller one, as Clarissa was part time). This new arrangement would mean a single share being applied across all four parishes. Exact numbers will be provided later by the diocesan finance team, but at 2025 figures, this would mean about £88,000 across the four, rather than £121,000.

Hopefully this will also help to answer the obvious question, "why can't we just stay as we are?". The DMPG has made these proposals in order to put the churches on the path to sustainability, to enable them to focus on mission and the growth of God's Kingdom. The process: the PCC meetings on 24th September and 1st October are for questions, discussion, and information. The individual PCCs are then asked to meet again at a later date to formally agree that they are in favour of this proposal.

#### Let's walk into the light

#### Bishop's Letter

A story that's often told in our churches comes from the fourth chapter of John's Gospel. It tells of Jesus, in the blinding heat of midday meeting a Samaritan woman at the well in a town called Sychar. The woman is hoisting up heavy buckets of water in the hot sun. She's there because she's a woman with 'a reputation' and it's the only time of day she can avoid the muttering of her neighbours who meet at the well at cooler hours.



In an extraordinary encounter, Jesus sees deep into the woman's heart. Through their conversation Jesus brings about her healing and restoration into the community from which she is estranged. It's a story of life, possibility, new beginnings and forgiveness.

The woman at the well is not the only Biblical story set in Sychar. There's another, contained in the 34<sup>th</sup> chapter of the Book of Genesis. This is a tale of terror that's never heard in our churches; the rape of a girl called Dinah. It's a dark, nasty tale of violence that wrecks the life of individuals, families and the entire community. So we don't speak about it. We keep it hidden.

Sometimes people say to me of safeguarding 'It's just a tick box exercise', an onerous compliance requirement. Rather I would say that our work in safeguarding asks fundamental questions about the kind of places we want our churches to be. Just like the Bible passages I've mentioned, we can be places of hiddenness, silence, and hurt. Or places of life, new beginnings and restoration.

Accounts like the Makin review have shone light on our story. We've also been working hard to bring about change.

While we cannot be complacent, I am intensely proud of all that was revealed about safeguarding in Bath and Wells by our independent audit that happened earlier this year. This told us that we are moving towards a much better story. So let's build on the momentum we have created. Let's walk into the light.

#### News in Brief from the Diocese


#### Coming together in worship

More than 2,500 pupils and staff came together to worship online recently. Led by Bishop Michael who opened the service by lighting a candle. The event brought Church of England schools together from Bath to Exmoor in song, prayer and reflection. Speaking with those gathered Bishop Michael spoke of Zacchaeus. He said, "It's a story that tells us that God never gives up on us, whoever we are and whatever we've done. All of us are always welcomed into God's family."

Director of Education Ed Gregory said, "The online gatherings will now be a regular opportunity for schools to worship together, celebrate faith and grow in community."

#### 82 years of service to the church

When 94-year-old Roy Jukes first began playing the organ in church, the Second World War was still underway. Roy was just 12 years old. Little did he know then that he would still be playing in his nineties. "By the time I was 10 or 11, I was playing short voluntaries before the morning service. Occasionally the organist failed to turn up, and I would play the hymns. Eventually my father came back from a trustees' meeting to tell me that I was appointed organist, that was on my 12th birthday!" Roy has no plans to draw the final stop, he says, "It's a way of life."

We welcome clothes, shoes, bedding toiletries, toys, baby clothes, candles. Anything but not large items.




The Friendship Group: meets on the 2nd Tuesday of the month.
