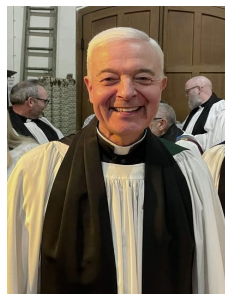

Reflections from the Ministry Team

Dear friends,

During the Christmas season you may have heard these spine tingling words from the prologue to John's Gospel. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God."



We are now in the beginning of a new year, 2026, with our hopes and dreams for the unfolding year ahead. For the Benefice of East Mendip Trinity and the Benefice of Midsomer Norton with Clandown we have reached a new beginning.

On the Feast of Epiphany, 6th January, I was licenced and inducted as Priest-in-Charge of the Benefice of East Mendip Trinity by Michael, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and Charlie, Archdeacon of Bath, remaining Vicar of the Benefice of Midsomer Norton with Clandown. This licencing marked the beginning of a new chapter, not only for me, but for the worshipping communities of Coleford, Holcombe and Kilmersdon with Babington and Midsomer Norton with Clandown.

The licencing service was attended by parishioners from all four parishes and clergy from the Deanery of Midsomer Norton. A quarter peal of Cambridge Minor was rung on Kilmersdon Church bells before the service, and refreshments were enjoyed by all afterwards. I felt affirmed and supported as I took on these new responsibilities.

I made the following remarks during the service, which I offer to you at the beginning of a new month!

"As we begin our 'journey' together, I look forward to learning more about the worshipping communities of Coleford, Holcombe, and Kilmersdon with Babington, and the gifts we have to offer in our witness of faith. And it is with our variety of gifts that we seek to live and tell the story of Jesus with the communities of which we are part.

Our churches are “Cribs” witnessing to the communities that surround them. Our role is to invite and welcome all to come and see, to join us in worship, and catch a glimpse of God’s love for us all.

Such encounters with God’s love give our questing hearts a voice to seek, to find, to worship, to rejoice.”

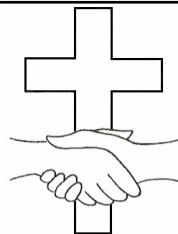
May the God of new beginnings bless us all,

Licensing and Induction of Father Guy to the East Mendip Trinity Benefice.

On the evening of the Feast of the Epiphany, 6th January 2026 in the Parish Church of St Peter and St Paul, Kilmersdon which is part of the East Mendip Trinity Benefice, a service was held as celebration for a New Ministry of Father Guy Scott as Priest-in-Charge of East Mendip Trinity Benefice. The induction and installation was carried out by The Right Reverend Dr Michael Beasley, Bishop of Bath and Wells and The Venerable Charlie Peer, Archdeacon of Bath.

Father Guy was presented to Bishop Michael by the Lay Dean, Carol Moore and the Associate Priest at his current parish, Midsomer Norton with Clandown, Philip Hopper.

Many serving and retired clergy from the Deanery were there to support Father Guy. The congregation comprised parishioners from the churches that form the East Mendip Trinity Benefice, Coleford, Holcombe and Kilmersdon with Babington as well as those from Midsomer Norton with Clandown. Representatives from these churches and the community informally welcomed Father Guy to his new post.

Bishop Michael gave a sermon with focus on The 3 Kings and giving the opportunity for the congregation to recall their past roles in Nativity plays. Several Epiphany hymns were sung and a collection was made for the Parish of St Peter and St Paul, Kilmersdon. Father Guy's first duty was to toll the bell to signify his arrival in his new parish. He then read out Notices regarding forthcoming services in his extended Ministry.

Following the service, refreshments were kindly provided and there was the opportunity for those present to congratulate Father Guy as well as for the parishioners from East Mendip Trinity to meet with those from Midsomer Norton with Clandown.

Bishop's Letter

Generations growing in faith together

Our extended family recently got together for a celebration. We were nine adults from 24-68, one toddler, and one dog, and it was glorious! The joy was simply in being together, whatever our age.

I sometimes wonder what would happen in the life of our churches if we could adopt the same outlook there? Each generation glad that the other is there. Each generation contributing something to the whole. Each generation looking to the interests of the others, making sure there was something that spoke to the others even if not to them.

The writer of the Chronicles records something you could miss if you weren't looking for it. In 2 Chronicles 20, when Judah was facing attack from Ammon and Moab, King Jehoshaphat proclaimed a fast and summoned the people. This is what it says in verse 13:

"All Judah stood before the Lord, with their little ones, their wives, and their children."

At a time of great peril, when the king was seeking the LORD, all generations came together to pray.

We often think of intergenerational meaning us older ones passing on wisdom to the younger ones, and that's certainly part of it. But a truly intergenerational family, which the church is, means all generations welcoming one another, valuing one another, learning from one another, and praying with and for one another. It's not a one-way thing.

Our younger generations are ambassadors from the future, with wisdom to give us about their culture, and how to share the timeless truths of the gospel with their peers. They are leaders and learners, just as we all are.

What might it look like across our diocese if we committed to making room for other generations? What might it look like if, like the people of God in ancient times, we came together in our year of especial focus on prayer - adults, young people, and little ones - and sought the power and wisdom of God together? I have a feeling we'd be surprised!

News in Brief from the Diocese

A new teaching programme for a group of rural churches in Bath and Wells has been put together to encourage parishioners to think about the significance of animals in the Bible and what the stories about them can teach us in 2026.

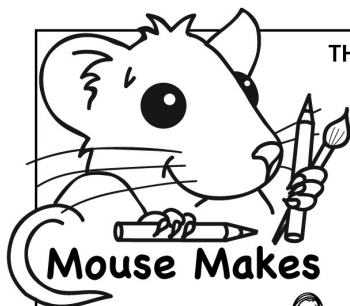
Sheep: "I am the good shepherd"

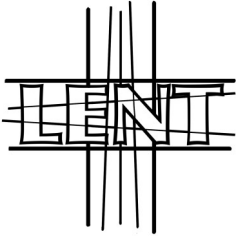

LENT



Lent begins on Wednesday 18 February in 2026
The last day of Lent is Thursday 2 April.

When the Lent period ends depends on how you count the 40 days; eastern and western churches observe Lent slightly differently.

In Western churches, Sundays are excluded.
While Lent concludes on Maundy Thursday,
some Christians continue fasting until Holy Saturday.

Eastern churches include Sundays, meaning Lent ends on the Friday before Palm Sunday, which marks the start of Holy Week. Holy Week leads up to Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday.

What does Lent mean?

The word “Lent” comes from the old English, “lencten,” which means “spring.” In Middle English is derived the words, lenten, lente, lent; related to the Dutch, lente, the German, Lenz, also rendered “spring.” In Old German lenzin, lengizin, and lenzo are related words, which probably comes from the same root as “long” and referring to “the lengthening days,” as the earth moves from the winter solstice toward the spring equinox.

What to do for Lent?

Some Christians denominations fast during Lent. They begin with the wearing of ashes on Ash Wednesday and give up meat, fish, eggs and more for the 40-day period. Others choose to give up comforts or luxuries such as chocolate, treat foods, social media or television.

For many Christians, Lent is a time where they make space to pray, read the Bible and reflect on God’s love.

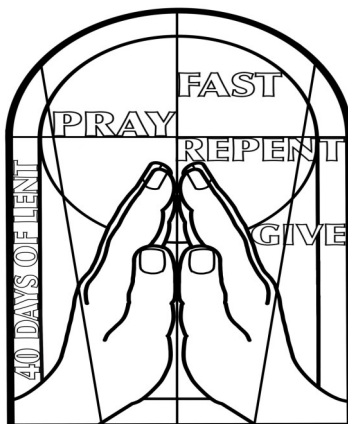
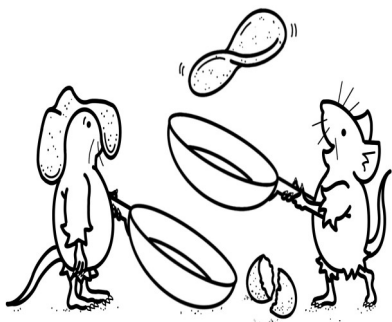
